Henry M. Robert & His Rules




- When: 1876 (same year as ACS)
- Who: 35 Chemists, led by Prof. Charles F. Chandler of the Columbia School of Mines
- What: Founded the American Chemical Society to "stimulate original research, awaken and develop talent ... provide fellowship and ensure a better appreciation of the science by the general public."
- Where: New York City
- First President: John William Draper

ACS Governance: Board, Council, and Committees





Responsibilities of the Board



A Board of Directors shall be the legal representative of the SOCIETY and as such shall have, hold, and administer all the property, funds, and affairs of the SOCIETY.

ARTICLE VII Section 1.a. ACS CONSTITUTION



Council



The popular deliberative assembly of the SOCIETY shall be known as the Council, which shall act in an advisory capacity to the SOCIETY and the Board of Directors and perform other duties as described in the Constitution, Bylaws, and Standing Rules.

ARTICLE VI Section 1.a. ACS CONSTITUTION

The Council shall establish Committees including but not limited to:



Membership Function

Council Executive Function

Committees Function

Elections Function

Governing Documents Function

Meetings Function

Units Function

More on Committees



Definition:

"...a body of one or more persons, elected or appointed by an assembly or society, to consider, investigate, or take action on certain matters or subjects, or to do all of these things."

Why Committees?

It helps Boards to be more efficient and effective, by serving as a way of doing complex, detailed and time-consuming work.

Types


- Standing perform ongoing function
- Special end when task is done

Authority:

Limited to consider/act upon issues as defined by the resolution creating them, their charge and duties in the Governing documents.



Basics


- Know the sequence for consideration
 - How the motions are made
 - o How the votes are taken

Why the basics?

- ACS operates on consensus and prefers informal procedures
- Strict application is perceived negatively

Formality and Size – Option 2





Formality of Procedure

Sequence for Consideration



- Motion made
- Second
- State the motion
- Debate
- Vote
- Announce the vote



Mover controls

Committee controls



Amendments (Add, Delete, Both)



- Amendment = secondary motion; must be "germane"
- Outside-in: Do the amendment first, then main motion
- Follow the sequence for consideration
- Can amend amendment, but no more can be pending
- If amendment approved: also vote on the underlying motion as amended (i.e. 2 votes are needed to adopt)



Special Rules for Committees



- "...motions to close or limit debate are not allowed in committees." [p. 477]
- Informal discussion of a subject is permitted while no motion is pending [p. 465]
- No limit to number of times a member can speak (p. 464)
- Chair is more active



Chair's Role in Committees



• Robert's: "In committees, the chairman is usually the most active participant in the discussions and work of the committee." [50:25, p. 476]

 ACS Practice: Chairs vote, but exercise caution in expressing strong views or speaking too often.



Common Procedural Errors



Moving to lay on the table

Not approving the agenda

 Calling the question/closing debate without motion Moving to a second main motion without addressing the first

Asking for abstentions

Friendly amendments

Chairs overactive in debate

Accept/Receive a report



New Sample Rules for Electronic Meetings



- Secretary sends all email with link or URL, time, backup phone number
- Schedule Internet availability at least 15 minutes before start
- Member sign in and maintain internet and audio access thru meeting
- Establish quorum at outset by audible roll call
- Each member responsible for own audio/Internet connection
- Chair may mute or disconnect a connection when undue interference
- Chair shall specify exact method of being recognized
- Secretary designates online area for display of pending motions
- Voting shall be by anonymous feature of Internet meeting service
- If large group, cause ongoing display of Chair and current speaker
